### St Mary's Hunton – Joyous Virtuoso Organ Recital

There are few things more magical than a summer's evening in an ancient church and churchyard. But, when that is accompanied by classical organ music, well, it doesn't get much better. Those who attended D'Arcy Trinkwon's previous performance in St Mary's Church, knew they were in for a treat -- though an entirely different repertoire meant that our interest remained piqued by his varied selection of pieces. For those of you, myself included, who get a bit twitchy during long concerts, D'Arcy's performances are a breath of fresh air. Each, relatively short musical piece was preceded by a brief but interesting historical tale. We learnt about the composer, the context in which the piece was written, as well as amusing anecdotes. It takes more than musical talent to incorporate cockroaches, false teeth and illegitimate children into an organ recital! He also explained a little about Hunton's prestigious Willis organ and the fact that no modifications have been made since it was installed. It sounds as it would have done when it was first made in 1864. The audience of 60 enjoyed pieces by Bach and Mendelssohn, the latter written when the composer was only 18 years old, as well as *Summer Sketches*, Op 73, by Edwin Lamare and *The Swan* by Camille Saint-Saens. The concert ended with a piece by a Norwegian composer, which D'Arcy initially considered to be awful. However, due to popular opinion the piece had its moment; moreover, the piece put a smile on everyone's face with its upbeat, 'seaside', feel!

Catching up with friends and neighbours in the interval, and for nibbles and fizz, it was hard to drag ourselves away. Indeed, the last concert goers did not leave until 11:00 pm. Thanks must go to everyone who was involved: D'Arcy Trinkwon, the organisers, canape-makers and flower arrangers who helped to make it a resounding success once again.

### Sheep Showing at the Kent Show, 2023.

Enthusiastic members of the Sharp family arrived at the Kent County Show Ground with our clean, and I thought, 'well behaved ' Jacob sheep. This was the first time at the show as a competitor, and not as a helper, and we were feeling quite rough round the edges. For two weeks we had been taming and halter training seven sheep; we were not confident they were ready! This feeling was made worse when one of our shearling ewes jumped out of her pen into another; apparently, 'her friend' was in that pen; urgently and with great speed, we reinforced the boundary hurdles.

During the afternoon, other competitors arrived, with a final flurry at teatime on Thursday evening. There was a good representation of Jacob sheep; this was lovely to see, as the existence of this class was at risk. We slept overnight in the livestock camping field and were eagerly at the sheep lines by seven in the morning. Our class was the first in the ring. Sadly, we had to forfeit the 'stockmen's breakfast', in order to make haste



preparing for our classes. Combs, clippers, sponges and halters all appeared because of the camaraderie between my lovely team. Everyone united in a common aim: to produce the best sheep at the show ground. Competitors keenly helped each other, making new friends and rejuvenating older friendships.

We had entered all of the Jacob classes, except the first for the older rams. Once we got going, we did not stop. There was not much time between classes. We busily led sheep into the ring and then out; then, into the ring again for the next class. Second prize in shearling Ram with Bruno, wow! A third with our lovely Ram lamb, Ryan. Then, a first! Yes, a 'red' in the older ewe class; winning with our favourite ewe Elsa. Then came the shearling ewes, and finally ewe lambs. Our showing skills were being seriously challenged at this point, as our 'group of three', sheep, were a bit of a shambles. We just kept smiling, having fun and learning a lot on the way!

The second day was for the young handlers. We weren't sure if they would actually go in the ring or go shy on us. Well, to our delight, all our youngsters decided to compete, all six of them. There was a mad rush to get the children ready for the ring. So that everyone could look their best, a mix and match of white coats and ties of various shapes and sizes were swopped across the sheep pens. I am told that they all did really well, especially as they were in huge classes; from the photos, it certainly looked that way, with all competitors receiving a rosette, and some feedback from the judge. Well done to you all!

The children participated in camping on the show ground, and enjoyed the disco, which was put on by the show organisers. It is something special to walk the animal lines at dusk, hearing them chewing the cud and settled in their beds after the crowds have gone home. Fun was had by all, a show to remember. What a feeling, 4 rosettes, in all the colours! The hard work was all worthwhile. Now, we look forward to the next time!

#### **Kenward Trust**

Kenward Trust was established 55 years ago when Ray Sinden decided to sell his home, and successful farming business, to purchase Kenward House, a large property in Yalding. His reason and vision were to provide members of the street sleeping homeless, in London, with a place of safety and recovery. The majority of these men were alcoholics.

Ray himself had come to faith in Christ at a relatively late age and he was passionate about a spiritual solution to addiction. The Trust remains faithful to the Christian ethos of care and uses the 12-step process of recovery; itself rooted in Christian principle for those residents who choose to adopt it. Addiction has, of course, moved on and many of the folk in the residential rehab unit have a drug using background. The common theme is a quest for recovery and freedom from substance misuse.

Kenward is supportive of those from all faiths and none. This caring sanctuary has provided a place of safety for hundreds of men and women, undoubtedly saving many lives in the process.

Kenward Trust is open to the public with a beautifully situated café; a great place to meet friends for an out-of-town coffee and delicious cakes. There are a variety of open days and, of course, the ever- popular alpaca walking experience. Do consider a visit to Kenward House, especially during this summer holiday period. 
### School's Out, All Quiet on West Street during August!
