Remembrance Day Service

Once again we were blessed with a good turnout of 80 people at this important service, conducted by Rev. David Jones. The church looked lovely with its flowers and silhouettes of WW1 soldiers. Children from Hunton School laid a wreath and placed crosses, Mark Dickenson, an ex Royal Engineer, read the names of the fallen and James Forster made a short presentation assisted by Jemima Goddard and Alice Simmons reading two poems beautifully, by an author with a very distant connection to Hunton.

We heard that the body of a previously unidentified soldier found on the Arras battlefield in 2013 has just been identified as 2nd Lt Osmond Bartle Wordsworth, killed on 2nd April 1917. He was a nephew of the poet but also a 5x Great Grandson of Henry Hatley, whose bust sits above the entrance to our church!

Thank you all for making this a special service and for raising £190 for the Royal British Legion.

Neighbourhood Watch - SCAMS

We have heard of several scams and cold calls relating to the insulation of your homes. This is in the news right now and the criminals always cotton on to the latest opportunities.

We received a call from a mobile phone telling us that homes in our postcode were among the worst insulated in the country. Leaving aside for the moment the use of a mobile to place the call, the caller had no idea what our postcode was nor who we were. At the very least this was a cold call touting for business, possibly from a rogue trader.

Kent police have told us of residents getting calls from a supposedly reputable organisation (the British Board of Agreement - BBA) saying they must inspect the house to ascertain whether the loft and wall insulation is compliant with the latest regulations. This is a scam, pure and simple and if you agree for them to come you will be letting criminals into your house.

OUR ADVICE - never react to cold calls or emails unless you are 100% certain they are genuine. If the call makes you think that you might need some work done, approach companies who have been recommended to you or who are listed in directories such as Trust Pilot - and always get at least 3 separate quotations for any work you want done.

So what is happening with the Reed Court Chicken Farm?

There is still no date for the chicken farm application to go before the Planning Committee. In fact other developments mean that this is now likely to be some time away.

If you have been keeping an eye on the planning website, you may have spotted that Maidstone Planning have recently written to Fridays and their planning advisors, DHA, to ask for a significant amount of additional information.

This formal "Regulation 25" letter can be found on the planning website and contains a request for more information in the following areas:

1. The first item states that the planning team's legal advice agrees with the WeLoveChainhurst ("WLC") legal opinion that a "sequential test" should have been carried out as part of the original application. In general terms, this is a test to demonstrate that, because areas less likely to flood should be developed ahead of those more likely to flood, Fridays and DHA should be able to demonstrate that they have checked there is nowhere else they should be developing ahead of Reed Court Farm. They've asked Fridays and DHA to provide information on any alternative schemes they've considered.
2. They've reminded the applicant that as part of the current policy governing applications such as theirs, they will need to demonstrate how their plans will provide a 10% net biodiversity gain.
3. They have asked them to respond to the wide variety of other feedback received by the planning team that has not yet been dealt with. A lot of that feedback comes from WLC, as well as other bodies like the Parish Councils, along with all the letters many of you wrote in response to the original application.

So what happens next? Well, they have 14 days from the publication of the Regulation 25 letter to indicate their timescale for response. WLC will be asking the planning team if that's been received once the 14 days lapses. After that it depends how much information they respond with. Whatever they supply, there will be another 30-day period to allow WLC, and anyone else who wishes to, to study any new information and respond.

So, as you can see, there is still some way to go before our Borough Councillors will get the chance to consider the application and, as always, we'll try our best to keep you informed.

Hunton Music Events – Hannah Scott gig and plans for 2022

The village had been very lucky to have enjoyed Live Music for two decades at the Hall, started by Alan Bishop and carried on by Mike Summersgill, with the regular support of Applause Rural Touring (who bring events to small venues, with Arts Council support). Mike has now re-started musical events in Hunton, initially with a venue change from the Hall to the Club to suit smaller audiences. So on Friday evening 12th November, we had Hannah Scott & Stefano della Casa bringing their new CD 'Drawn to Darkness' to a select audience of 25 people.

Hannah had played the Hall twice before but the Club acoustics worked well, particularly with the very quiet and attentive audience. She sung all her own songs on guitar and keyboard, several being about her grandmothers (one lovely, one less so!) and other family members, plus her own take on past relationships. The cello backing by Stefano, who plays many other instruments on the CD and produced the album, added wonderfully to the atmosphere; while the topics were not always upbeat, the words were very heartfelt.

Thanks to Doug and Sam for doing the Bar so well, and to the Hall for lending us their PA; although the event made a small loss, it has encouraged us to continue. Hunton's Grade 1 Listed Building

There are 71 listed buildings and other structures in Hunton but only one of these is Grade 1 – St Mary's Church. It is a wonderful asset for the village and greatly valued, both by those who worship there and by the many more who help to look after it and its graveyards.

The building in part dates back about 1,000 years to Saxon times, with additions made in the early Middle Ages, Elizabethan, Jacobean and Victorian eras. There is some ancient and beautiful stained glass and doors that were made in 1415, the year that the Battle of Agincourt took place. As such a veritable catalogue of our nation's history it can take a degree of looking after but can also be fascinating to learn more about!

The Friends of St Mary's have been, and continue to be, a wonderful support helping to finance work that needs to be done and we are very grateful for this. Perhaps less well known are the activities of the church Fabric Committee who seek to ensure that the building is maintained, buying in specialist help when required.

Following the very sad death of Alison Ellman-Brown (Churchwarden), the resignation of past Chairman and long time member Guy Oliver and with the planned departure from the village of Roger Sawtell, we need some fresh faces on the committee. On a personal note, I would like to thank both Roger and Guy for all that they have done over many years that they have served on this committee. Their skills, enthusiasm, commitment and energy have put us in a very strong position in seeking to maintain the building for future generations.

As to what the role requires, it is not particularly onerous with quarterly meetings the norm, and you do not need to be a churchgoer. Any building experience or contacts might be helpful but are not required – just an interest and some common sense will suffice!

If you are interested in helping to preserve this building and can spare just a little time I would love to hear from you. We already have one volunteer but a second would be very welcome!
