



Plans to reduce speed limit on danger road

Good news for the village's road safety campaigners who have been pressing for action to reduce the speed limit in West Street - particularly the stretch passing the primary school where it was feared children could be injured or even killed in a serious accident due to speeding vehicles.

Maidstone Borough Council has contacted the parish to say that, after a region-wide review of the speed limits in several village areas, it has been decided to reduce the 40mph limit through Hunton to 30mph.

"Subject to funding by the Kent County Council, the necessary changes will be made this summer," said Borough Transport head Steve Goulette. The new limit will extend from the Village Hall, past Bensted Close and Grove Lane, to the bends near the old Prince of Wales (Gudgeon) pub.

Acting Parish Council Chairman Lorraine Redfarn, who is also involved with the school administration, said: "This is really welcome news if the new limit is enforced - although we had been pressing for it to be reduced to 20mph." She said the school was also considering plans to make the entrance safer.

Play equipment sound - but car park needs repair

Repairs have been carried out to the play equipment in King George's field next to the Village Hall, making it safe and secure for children. The parish council is now considering placing a seat and tables nearby for watching parents, as well as fencing to keep dogs off the play area.

Village Hall chairman Alan Bishop said that link fencing was also needed to protect the adjoining playing fields. "At present there is no way to stop anyone from driving in and I would hate to see tyre marks left all across the cricket pitch." He also pressed for further work on the hall car park. "A lot of money was spent - more than £12,000 - on repairs but the work does not seem to have been completed properly; now whenever it rains a huge hole appears and it's getting worse. It seems a shame if all the good work is undermined when all it requires is a form of drainage into the ditch and, perhaps, a couple of lorry-loads of material." The council is taking action.

Anne Bishop is looking for volunteers to take part in a work party to trim back hedges around the hall. There was good support for the internal painting over two weekends.

Liz Oliver, of Elm Corner Farmhouse, who has served on Hunton Parish Council for some 16 years, has decided not to stand for re-election in May, when a vacancy will arise. Anyone interested should contact the chairman or clerk, whose telephone numbers are listed below.

Question of Principles or Compromise?

In recent months the question of whether it is always better to stay linked with people you fundamentally disagree with has come to the fore in the world wide Anglican Church. Archbishops from around the globe met last month to work out the right way forward, given the fact that North America has enthroned a practising gay Bishop.

While some countries can accept this move, largely on the grounds of compassion, the majority believe that it goes against the fundamental teachings of the Christian faith. The result of the Primates' meeting was that for the next three years the two sides will have a time and a space to ponder their positions and hopefully to reflect on the good things in the other party's argument. (No doubt, whichever side of the fence we sit on, we all have something to learn from the other).

But all this bids a more general question. Which is more important ... to stand up for what you believe in, or to let go of your principles in the name of peace? We face this question daily in relationships; families; local, national and international and faith communities. In the times of the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah, people again were not being faithful to God, and while the priests and prophets were saying: "Peace, Peace, you have nothing to fear, God loves you," God was angry because of his people's disobedience and because their religious leaders did not speak His truth. (Jeremiah 6:13&14)

So maybe the next question in such dilemmas is: which path would bring real Peace? For surely real Peace is much more than the absence of argument, or the presence of visible unity. As the church is finding, such questions sometimes take a long time to answer. It's about trying to be honest with ourselves - about our motives, and about seeking God's agenda, not our own. It's about trying to follow in the steps of Jesus, who walked the path of faithfulness and compassion most perfectly.

Farewell to loyal resident Mrs B.M. 'Molly' Shepherd: Hunton resident for 40 years, Mrs Barbara Mary 'Molly' Shepherd, known and respected for her kind and happy nature, has died aged 94. The Revd Roger Castle returned to Hunton to conduct the funeral service (postponed for two days because of snowy conditions), which was followed by burial in the churchyard.

Born in Leigh-on-Sea, Essex, Molly worked in the Bank of England in London before meeting and later marrying Edmund Shepherd, an orthopaedic surgeon working at St Barts. When he found a post in the Maidstone area the couple moved to the county town in the mid-1950s, moving to Grove Lane 10 years later.

Molly, a loyal St Mary's church supporter, was always interested in art, being asked to judge a children's competition on one occasion. She also shared Edmund's interest in sailing and keeping their large garden looking immaculate. The couple have two sons, Peter a consultant physician and Patrick.

Mrs F. Jean Fisher - a regular churchgoer sadly missed: Another keen member of St Mary's congregation, Mrs F. Jean Fisher, who had long local links, died earlier this year. A former Sussex tennis player, she came to Willow Grove, Yalding in 1953, moving a couple of years later to Riverside, Hunton before returning to the neighbouring village to live at Downs Farm House.

Her daughter Frances Jones, now living in Norfolk, recalling the family's happy years locally, said: "Mummy had an enormous sense of duty and was particularly good at visiting people when they had retired and were in nursing homes. She loved interior decorating, gardening and arranging flowers. She was a former British Legion Women's Branch chairman in Yalding and later took on *Meals on Wheels*."

Cathedral organist to play in Yalding: Canterbury Cathedral organist and choirmaster Dr David Flood, will be giving a recital on the Peter Conacher & Co (Huddersfield) organ at St Peter and St Paul's Church, Yalding on Saturday 23 April at 7.30pm. Warning: 'Find gipsy camps or we will'

Parishes have been warned that if they do not put forward planned sites for gipsy camps in their area, the Government could make their own selection and force them onto the communities.

The warning came from Maidstone Borough Councillor John Williams, who reported that one way being discussed by members aiming to ease the problems of illegal gipsy roadside camps was to ensure that they had the capacity for transit encampments. "Then if a problem arose families could be moved into these sites temporarily while their case was being resolved. If they were too big there might still be the difficulty of families living together so, ideally, there should be a number of smaller ones. But these should not be too remote and would have to be near to public services and transport."

Mr Williams said that these facilities are not available at the KCC highways depot at the top of Barn Hill which had been suggested at one stage as a possible site. No other locations have yet been mooted.
