Teams of people are now helping, some on almost a daily basis, to ensure the "wheels don't fall off"

'Proclaiming the Faith Afresh'

Proclaiming the Faith Afresh was the theme of last month's Diocesan Conference at Bognor Regis. Over 500 delegates from across the Diocese of Rochester gathered to hear noted speakers, attend various workshops and enjoy some remarkably good food and entertainment!

The main speakers were Elaine Storkey often heard on Radio 4's 'Thought For The Day', Rev'd David Coffey, general secretary of the Baptist Union, Canon Gavin Ashenden, chaplain of Sussex University and the Rev'd Paul Bayes, the National Adviser on Evangelism and Mission.

The whole conference was geared towards having us make the unchanging Gospel: the Good News of Jesus, as fresh as the day it was first proclaimed in the coming of Jesus Christ; and to encourage and challenge us to be more confident in the ministry and mission to which we are called.

Highlights for me were the workshop on how to read the bible properly in church, with some very challenging and humorously led demonstrations by Lance Pierson.

In the final service every Parish in the Diocese was given a candle - you will have seen the candle alight on the alter. A very important part of the conference was meeting other clergy and lay-folk from the Diocese, and the bonding which took place. There should be more home grown events where such 'bonding' can be enabled, (a plug here for our 'Benefice United' meeting held each fortnight at the Coxheath centre).

On the last evening a variety show and pantomime was performed which included an hilarious rendition of 'Mud, Mud, Glorious Mud', by three archdeacons! And a violin performance by our very own Sue Elliott.

We left Bognor buoyed-up by an injection of Christian love and fellowship and a rekindling of our faith as we seek to proclaim it afresh in our parishes and the wider world.

Highway Mayhem for Hunton

The shock closure of West Street, the main route between Hunton and Yalding, left motorists annoyed and frustrated by the inconvenience and disruption to their daily drive in and out of the village.

Access Only signs were erected and the narrow country lane was restricted to single file traffic as the roadworks were carried out. The school bus was disrupted for a few days leaving the children at the bus stop with no information about what was happening and then ran the gamut of accessing the lane to get the youngsters to school.

A foot-wide channel was dug by the workmen from contractors McNicholls in conjunction with British Telecom to take new optic fibre cabling for the upgrading of the Broadband system supplying the village.

This fortnight-long work, started on Monday February 6th, caught many by surprise including the Parish Council which had not been notified; it was unaware that the council had received official notification and had not seen any notices in the Kent Messenger or Kent & Sussex Courier.

But the KCC highways authority has assured councillors that all statutory notices were displayed and the contractors carried out a letter drop to inform residents directly affected. "And we worked with the school bus and the service bus to ensure they received the necessary escort to get through the roadworks," said a county council spokesman.

"We received reports that a few drivers were ignoring the Access Only signs, which were then improved and the police informed to keep a watch and prevent motorists using West Street as a short cut.

The Herald was informed: "Some jokers caused consternation by turning the diversion sign around sending people along Bishops Lane. One resident was particularly upset as people had no alternative other than to turn around in their driveway. But perhaps some village people were pleased as it was the quietest fortnight on the main road through the village for many years!"

A Bridge Too Far?

The Public Rights of Way officer has been praised for his speedy action carrying out improvements to overcome the hazards of the Greensand Way footpath access onto Hunton Hill.

Parish councillor Gary Thomas reported that shortly after a site meeting to discuss the problems, new wooden posts and railings had been erected on the steep incline to the road.

"In the past this had proved dangerous for walkers descending onto the road with its fast flow of traffic," said Mr Thomas adding that overgrown bushes had also been cut back and a finger post direction sign erected.

Chairman Roger Sawtell felt that the answer might be for a bridge to be built across the Hill road and he had seen one locally that blended in well with the local landscape. But borough councillor Brian Mortimer quipped that this might be a "bridge too far!"

Finally, the recent Teston tragedy is very sad. The lady who died was well known and respected in the parish and I was very impressed by the wonderful tribute to her made by parishioners and others over the weekend.

Ready Veggie Go.

March is the month to really get started on growing vegetables. And growing vegetables is becoming more and more popular with people wanting to know what is going into the food they eat and longing for vegetables with a good home grown flavour. Living in Hunton I am more than tempted to grow vegetables due to the lack of shops offering a ready supply.

So far I have been successful with onions (from sets), cut and come again salad leaves and french beans, which are happier in hot summers than the more normally grown runner beans (and any way I like them better). This winter we have had Brussels sprouts from plants begged from a friend and planted to fill out a bed for the Open Gardens. They had no care over the summer at all so imagine my surprise when I lifted the leaves to discover a crop of the green nuggets that grace every Christmas dinner.

Perhaps the best way to learn though is to go out and buy a few packets of seeds and get some of your own practical experience.
