



Mobile Home Worries Residents

Real fear has been expressed by residents living in the extensive grounds of Jennings country house about a mobile home that has been positioned on a nearby plot of land off Lughorse Lane and believed to be used by travellers.

Heather Larman, one of a dozen worried residents overlooking the site, voiced her fears at the September Parish Council meeting. She said hardcore had been laid at the field entrance and could lead to more travellers descending on Hunton.

Asked what action was being taken she was told that the leader of Maidstone Borough Council's enforcement team, Hilary Orr, had been contacted. She said the ownership of the land 'housing' the mobile home had to be established.

"If, as we suspect, the land has been sold to the home occupier, or the home is permanently sited with the owner's permission, then the council will serve a temporary stop notice against additional caravans. This will be followed by an enforcement notice."

But Borough Councillor Brian Mortimer warned that this would not happen overnight and could take several weeks or months to be finalised. Meanwhile he urged local people to form a Residents' Association to give them strength in stating their objections and to lobby all those in authority.

Residents' concerns included tipping; no system for getting rid of waste; bonfires at all hours, and other serious health and safety factors. One summed it up saying: "It's a nightmare in which this field beside a lovely country lane could soon become a real eyesore."

Be Alert

The Mid Kent police area is still suffering from overnight crime. The offenders are regularly changing their vehicles and usually drive around the area during the day. If challenged they state that they are looking for scrap metal, looking for their lost dog, reminiscing about when they went hop picking in the area, or they just totally ignore you, laugh and keep looking around for something to come back that night and steal. Also..... there has been a spate of thefts of satellite navigation equipment and mobile phones from vehicles parked at the Village Hall and cars parked by fishermen. An alarm did not deter one theft. Please do not leave valuables such as these in your vehicles!

Dear Friends,

I mentioned in the August letter about our forthcoming chaplaincy work in France. I thought you may like to know what we actually did - or at least a summary of the work. I had to submit two reports to the 'Intercontinental Church Society' who sponsor seasonal chaplaincies. One report is more detailed the other less so. The latter I reprint here so that you have some idea of what Diana and I actually did. PETER.

SAUMUR SEASONAL CHAPLAINCY - 8TH -22ND August 2006.

Arrived safely at Ile d'Offard site and the CIS youth hostel. Met some staff we had seen on the previous visit two years ago. Next day called on Father Joseph at Villbernier and had a truncated conversation in my schoolboy French and his non-existent English! Visited L'Etang de la Breche site and met staff who had the chaplaincy bags ready for us. Leafleted cars on the site and spoke to a number of the folk. Some, if not all, were surprised that there was a chaplain in the area!

Over the following days we leafleted the supermarkets, 'Hypermarche' and 'leClerc', also the tourist office in Saumur. We visited a number of sites - surprisingly 'Val de Loire' did not want us to visit on the camp - different to our last visit in 2004. They did take leaflets and a poster. In 2004 we were refused entry to 'Camping Montsabert'. This time was fine, and we had a good visit there; a quieter camp and situation. We had an in-depth conversation with an older couple who had once been reps on the site. He avowed that he was an atheist - he was quite deaf, but I witnessed to him by squatting at his level and making sure he could lip-read. He seemed 'moved' and receptive.

We later visited 'Vallee Des Vignes' -Concourson sur Layon. A little far away, but worth the visit.

There seem to be not so many Brits on the sites. Many pass through and rarely here on a Sunday.

'Eureka!' A team of some 30+ 'Christians in Football' arrived at the hostel. Good talks with them. As a result the French Pastor phoned me and we subsequently attended a Saturday night outreach service at 'Eglise Evangelique' in Saumur. The footballers had been singing and witnessing in Saumur that afternoon and inviting folk to attend the service. Pastor Marc hoped that some ongoing link might be made with ICS. He said that he was wondering how he could reach-out to the Brits in the area. Great potential here I'm sure. He indicated that we could use his church building (modern) for our services!

SUNDAY AUGUST 13TH: Bible passage: St. Matthew 17:14-21

'How is your Faith doing?'

Attendance: 46 of which 10 children. Family Service and H/C. All stayed. Communicants: 38.

Great to see Emma and son Elliot in the congregation. They are regular attendees back home. Emma read the lesson. Stephen, retired Priest from Durham assisted with the chalice. Great singing - all unaccompanied! Collection: 122 Euros + £45.

During the first week I managed to break off a piece of tooth on the famous French bread! The staff at the Hostel sent me to a dentist in town. A temporary repair was done by Sophie. I spoke to her about Jesus in half French/English. Gave her a copy of 'Why Jesus?' by Nicki Gumbel.

Met two Polish lads staying at the Hostel. Had some interesting chats about life. Gave both a copies of 'Why Jesus?' Continued in second week to leaflet supermarkets. Visited all the other camps again. A small camp at Villbernier - no Brits but left leaflets.

SUNDAY AUGUST 20TH: Bible passages: Psalm 103:6-13 St Matthew 1:20-21

Attendance: 23 of which 9 children. Family service with H/C. All stayed. Communicants: 23.

Steve a Baptist Minister assisted with the Chalice. We were late in starting - Fr. Joseph had a Baptism. Collection: 40 Euros.

Out and Out - Dryad's Saddle

For several years I have admired the large specimen of this fungus whose scientific name is *Polyporus squamosus* on an old stump on the left as one descends Hunton Hill. It may appear anytime between Spring and Autumn and in many years fruits twice. The brackets wither after some weeks and fall off, to be replaced afresh later. It also grows on one of the trees dividing the Hunton playing fields where it may be inspected rather more safely. The underside of the cap has numerous pores recalling a bee's nest although not as regularly hexagonal, and this gives the first part of its name. The cap is scaly, the Latin word for which is squama hence the second. Autumn is the classic time for fungi. Some species such as Dryad's Saddle are easy to identify, and others not. There are many good field guides to fungi, but I think the best is Roger Phillips' published by Pan as it is relatively easy to browse and the photos are stunning. He has a good website with lots of pictures at www.rogersmushrooms.com.

Hunton Club Book Group August Book Review - Our Kid by Billy Hopkins

It was on a night in 1928 that Billy Hopkins made his first appearance. His tenement home on the outskirts of Manchester would be considered a slum today but he lived there happily with his large Catholic family, hatching money making schemes with friends. When war came and the Luftwaffe dominated the sky Billy was evacuated to Blackpool. There he lived on a starvation diet whilst his own rations went to feed his landlady's children.

Nostalgic, sad and funny, *Our Kid* recalls an upbringing and an environment now vanished.

Members enjoyed the historical aspect of this book, particularly the war years. Although there were mixed feelings about the dialogue. Overall, it was not considered to be a literary masterpiece but a good, easy read, in fact to quote, "a nice little book". Members scored the book 6½ out of 10.

The book for September is *The Stand* by Stephen King.

Hunton: Still a Heavy Lorry Short-Cut.

No let up on the number of heavy lorries taking shortcuts and rumbling through the narrow country lanes of Hunton. That was the depressing news received by Parish Councillors at their September meeting.

Reporting from a Traffic Management Partnership Meeting (TRAMP) Cr Gary Thomas said: "The Kent County Council has totally ignored requests from the rural areas made in 2004 on lorry management as well as calls for a reduction in the speed limits."

"In Gloucestershire and Leicestershire schemes are operating to stop lorries using country lanes. We want this example to be followed in Kent. In the other counties the Freight Transport Association has complained, but they will just have to accept that the ban is making life safer and more tolerable for residents."

The TRAMP meeting heard that a £20,000 scheme to end the misery of rat-running lorries in Maidstone's rural areas has been shelved until at least 2008. Yalding have been campaigning for nine years for 17-tonne lorries to be banned from the central Town Bridge.

Chairman John Wilson said that life had become "intolerable" in villages like East and West Farleigh, Hunton, Teston and Collier Street, as well as Yalding, because of lorries using cut-throughs and back routes to reduce journey times. "The current situation cannot be allowed to continue."

Cr Thomas also reported to the Hunton meeting on the proposed footpath between Benstead Close and the Village Hall. "If the authorities are unable to buy the land involved, they may have to go for compulsory purchase because of the safety issues."

Can PCSOs Deliver for Hunton?

Plans are being finalised confirming Hunton Parish Councillors' fears that the village is to lose its policeman, PC Gary Shaw, who has been praised for actively getting involved in parish life over the past year.

Kent police have held a briefing to inform parishes in the Maidstone rural district of a new scheme in which current officers will become part of a wider operation backed up by new Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs).

Councillors feared that the officer's workload would increase with different priorities and he might not be able to devote the time he has in the past to smaller villages like Hunton. They suggested that he might not be able to keep a friendly watch over local incidents, for instance, such as a child kicking a football against a car in Bensted Close. By April next year it was hoped that the new system would be "up and running" with an Inspector and Sergeant in charge of a team of officers in the rural area backed up by around 12 PCSOs.

Parish Councillor Gary Thomas said that it looked as though Hunton and Coxheath would have just one PCSO and with Coxheath being the larger village it would receive most attention. Boxley has its own PCSO but the Council has paid for the privilege at a cost considerably higher than the Hunton precept.

Council Chairman Roger Sawtell felt that the new operation was being introduced with the backing from Home Office authorities who want to see a network of officers playing more of a community role but members feared that this might not be achieved.

Road Tax Blitz

In October, the police in liaison with the DVLA are going to be dealing with abandoned and untaxed vehicles in the Maidstone Borough Council area.

If you have any details on such vehicles please pass them to Gary Shaw. Please could you include the make and model, registration marks and colour of any vehicle in your location. DVLA will be obtaining back duty for the road tax and/or destroying the vehicles if they are found on the road or in a public parking area.

How Can I Help a Child This Christmas?

It is difficult for men and women in prison to send Christmas presents to their children. *Angel Tree* comes to the rescue.
