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Council Seeks Support from KCC to Clean Up

After complaints by local resident Guy Oliver about the heavy amounts of litter by the roadside in East Street, the Parish Council is to contact the KCC to ask for its 'hit squad' to carry out a tidying up operation.

School Supports Footpath Away from the Road

The latest option for making it safer for pedestrians walking between Bensted Close and the Village Hall, is for a footpath to be installed back from the roadside and behind the hedge on the northern side.

Parish Council Chairman, Roger Sawtell, reported that it would require small bridges at either end to cross ditches while the hedge would have to be cut to a uniform height.

"This would make it more secure for pedestrians who would be further from the roadside and not be splashed by water from passing cars; and importantly this scheme would only be a fraction of the cost of a roadside path."

Hunton school is keen for the footpath to be installed as it would relieve the parking situation as parents could park at the Village Hall and walk down West Street.

Accident Black Spot in East Street

Two residents have complained about dangerous hairpin bends in East Street, where several accidents have occurred in recent years with cars spinning off the road and colliding with property walls and knocking down fences. Richard Furlong of Stonewall Oasthouse has written to the Parish Council seeking action from the Kent Highways to rectify the problem.

"We have lived here since 1967 with the threat of vehicles losing control leaving the highway and damaging our fence. We can recall around eight such accidents and those involved have included an Army scout car and a police car being used for advanced driving instruction. "Quite clearly we should not be put to the repeated costs of fence repairs. We would like to see a suitable Armco barrier, the restoration of chevrons and reflector posts."

The Parish Council is to press Kent Highways to carry out work at this bend and the next one towards Marden after a further complaint from resident Carole Manley about damage from crashing vehicles to the wall of her Grade II listed property. She would also like to see a grit box installed by the road for motorists getting into difficulty in snowy and icy conditions.

Floral Display for Window Restoration

A combined demonstration of stained glass window restoration and a flower festival is to be staged at St Mary's Church, Hunton from Friday to Sunday October 2-4th.

The organisers explain that the idea is to take a theme or subject from the windows at St Mary's - now undergoing restoration - and use them to create a flower display. The windows could be photographed and the image detail - such as birds and flowers - 'blown up' so that they can be incorporated in the arrangements.

Dear Friends,

The Gospel of John reports: 'on the first day of the week Jesus came and stood among them'. So it was Easter Day night. The disciples were unsure as to what was happening - some had said that Jesus was alive again - the women at the tomb had brought strange news; two men on the Emmaus road had encountered Jesus - and now, if doubt existed, doubt was to be removed, certainly for all but Thomas, for there was Jesus among them, though the doors were locked. Yes, Jesus accomplished many things in just a few minutes: He came to them- he spoke with the disciples - he showed them his wounds - he commissioned them and gave them a special gift.

Yes, the doors were locked, but Jesus still came to them. If death couldn't hold him, locked doors couldn't! 'Jesus came and stood among them'. Jesus spoke to them: 'peace be with you'. How the disciples needed to hear those words - those days of the past week were so totally perplexing, and yet, here was Jesus with them again offering words of peace. And Jesus showed them his wounds, his hands, his side. There was no doubt about it - Jesus certainly suffered that cruel death on a cross; here where the cruel nails impress. The immediate result of this appearance of Jesus? 'Then were the disciples overjoyed to see their Lord' Then came the commissioning: 'As the Father has sent me, even so I send you'.

Yes, Jesus had come from the Father with a special commission; that commission *had not* just begun at the birth of Jesus, it had begun before all time, and it saw its fulfilment in the birth, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus. So Jesus commissions the disciples. The original Greek word is 'Apostello' - but it means more than to just 'send' - no, the disciples were being sent with a special mission: to teach, preach and baptise. We get the word 'Apostle' from this - a person sent with a specific goal and duty. This duty and goal could only be achieved with the very special gift that Jesus was to Give. He breathed on them and said: 'receive the Holy Spirit; if you forgive the sins of any they are forgiven and if you retain the sins of any, they are retained'. It is no coincidence that these words are used at the Ordination of a new Priest.

So not in their own strength, but always in God's strength through the Holy Spirit, that gentle breath of God breathing life into all. Jesus 'breathed on them'. We can think of other instances of breath being the means of giving life and power, not least the story of creation when God formed man and breathed life in to him.

So for you and I Jesus comes to us - He has come to you, for why ever else would you have faith? Jesus speaks to us - have you not heard in that still inner being the voice of he who calls and leads us? Jesus shows us - have we not 'seen' the Living Lord active in our lives and in the lives of others? Jesus commissions us too - 'so I send you'. We may not feel anything like those first disciples, but God has always had a plan for your life and mine. Jesus also gives us - he promises never to leave us, though we often leave him - 'I will not leave you desolate' - what a desolate place the cross was for Jesus hanging there with the sins of the whole world on him - yet he was never left there - the resurrection proved that. The Gospel writer says: 'these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in his name'.

Jesus Christ comes into *our* upper room - our lives, and speaks words of peace and asks of us to live for him and in so doing gives us the power to do these things. And we have the promise: 'Lo, I am with you always even to the end of time'.

The Hunton Club Book Club Book Review.

'The Olive Readers' by Christine Aziz was the winner of the Richard and Judy 'How to Get Published' Prize. It was one of 45,000 books entered for this competition. The story is best described as science fiction based in a world where a few huge corporations govern the country with the company controlling the water supply having a strangle hold. In this world are a group of people with a hidden resource of books to read and discover a halcyon past which they vow to recreate.

We found this book disappointing, badly structured and even amateurish. We liked the themes and felt we could recognise the world as one which our present could become. There were a few flashes of brilliant prose like the description of nights as 'brittle and metallic like embroidered silk'. Overall though the story meandered about trying to cover too much ground and contained confusing threads woven in for no real reason. Our score of 3.5 out of ten is probably the lowest score yet.

Hunton School News

Upper School After a delay due to bad weather Upper School eventually made it to Horton Kirby. They walked around the village of Horton Kirby looking at evidence of the Victorian village, followed by an afternoon in a Victorian classroom where writing on blackboards, the cane (!!!) and a dunce's hat were all the order of the day. Following on from this work the children have produced some wonderful pieces of writing about the punishments in a Victorian School. The children and staff fully took on the role, wearing Victorian era clothes and had a superb day. Upper School are continuing to learn about life in Victorian Britain, focusing on schooling and the games children played in their free time. They will also study Victorian and modern maps of Hunton and Coxheath in order to learn how the area has changed and developed since Victorian times.

Reception Class Reception's topic this term is 'growing' and they enjoyed a fantastic trip to Brookside Garden Centre. They have been studying caterpillars and have planted some potatoes. They will also be growing other produce in their garden in time for their 'Grand Reception Lunch' in the summer term.

Lower School's topic is 'Global Gardens' and they are learning about the impact of global warming both in the UK and abroad. The children will use Google Earth to look at a variety of terrains around the world, looking at the similarities and differences between continents. They will think about what plants, including foods, are grown in the UK and the impact of food miles. The children will use a range of data to investigate temperatures around the world and temperature changes. During the term Lower School will be visiting Yalding Organic Gardens to look at the greenhouses and plants grown.

Middle School are learning about space; they will be learning facts about the planets and what it would be like to be an astronaut in space. They will be considering the great space race and the latest progress with space travel. They will use shadow puppets to recreate a moon landing and write about the night using poetic images. In science they will be learning about light sources and day and night, how shadows are made and that light travels.

Out and Out - The Worm that Turns

In average garden soil there is likely to be 53,767 worms per acre, these worms will turn around 14 tons of soil annually, depositing two tenths of an inch of nutrient rich castings on the soil surface. These castings are 5-7 times richer in essential plant nutrients (nitrogen, potash and phosphates) than the surrounding soil and are rich in calcium and magnesium. And to top all this, the worms' burrows help to aerate and drain the soil.

This astounding information was discovered by Charles Darwin whose bicentenary is being celebrated this year. Better known for his work on evolution his book on worms sold more copies, more quickly than 'On The Origin of Species'. A fitting gardening celebration of Darwin's life would be to get out and spread rotted garden compost on the surface of the soil to encourage these beasts. And perhaps as the worm quietly turns your soil you may have time to visit Down House, near Biggin Hill, the house where Darwin carried out his research on worms, and also wrote 'On The Origin of Species'.
