Dear Friends

I write this as I sit in a very crowded Madeira airport waiting area, having just heard that our flight home is cancelled due to bad weather! Not the best end to an otherwise enjoyable holiday. One of the most interesting and fascinating things about this beautiful, verdant place is the network of levadas, or water channels, that criss-cross the island. The word 'levada' means 'carry' in Portuguese and they allow the water that springs up naturally to be distributed across the island for the purposes of irrigation. They reach from the north and west to the south and east through some 1,350 miles (2,170 km) of channels that were started in the sixteenth century and which continued to be built right up until the 1940s. Madeira is very mountainous and building them was a dangerous business in which several people lost their lives. They required about 25 miles (40 km) of tunnels to be dug through the mountains as well as needing channels cut into the vertiginous faces of the mountains. The system today operates on a shared usage basis and each person who needs the water to irrigate their crops buys a timeshare – literally a number of hours in a given period when the water flow is directed to their land. As we walked along the paths that are there for maintaining the channels and now used by tourists to get an entirely different perspective on the landscape of the island of Madeira, it reminded me that when the early church formed they were all together and had all things in common. They sold their possessions and belongings and distributed the proceeds to all, as any had need (Acts 2:44). The principle of creating and building something for the common good, accessible to all and beneficial to all who wish to access it, is one that we must continue to strive for in an era of self interest and focus on the individual, both in the church and in society. I pray that we will all have the opportunity to do our part.

## Community Orchard Bat Watch

Around 20 people joined in to spot bats around the church and playing fields on Thursday Sept 4<sup>th</sup>. With advice from a bat expert and the aid of digital bat detectors we were able to detect the unique signals emitted by different bat species: on this occasion by the larger noctule bats and the much smaller pipistrelle bats. There are 17 species of bat to be found in the United Kingdom and over 1000 worldwide. All British bats and their roosts are protected by law and it is illegal to deliberately alter their roost sites without first seeking advice from the Bat Conservation Trust. Conducting wildlife surveys such as these is an ongoing part of the development of the Hunton Community Orchard. The information gathered is used to create a picture of what is happening to our native wildlife across Kent and contributes to local strategies aimed to help protect our wildlife and countryside environment.

## Village Hall Refurbishment News

Hopefully those residents who attended the Harvest Supper will have noticed the newly painted and cobweb-free Hall, along with its freshly renovated floor, and thought how lovely it looks. At half term, the final stage of the refurbishment (flooring in the kitchen and toilet areas) will have been completed, and the new fire door and locks in place. We are fortunate to have such a lovely facility, run by volunteers for the community as a charity, along with Parish Council overview/trusteeship.

Between the Parish Council, KCC (through the Playgroup) and the Hall Committee over £12,000 will have been spent this summer renovating the building and there is more to be completed on the entrance areas and internal safety measures in the next year. The Hall costs a minimum of £6000 a year (£120/week) solely for the power, water, drainage plant, insurances, licencing and regular maintenance activities, let alone paying for cleaning after every hire event and funding any new equipment. In the winter, with our 'antique' electrical heating, those weekly costs can double – in summer of course, the Parish's solar panels help to defray our mains power usage (in daylight).

We are lucky that the previous Committee had built up some funds over the years, which allowed us to pay for some of the recent work, but that has now been all spent. Fortunately, we have become a sought-after venue for weddings (with Kathy's astute marketing of the website) and we have 11 booked for 2015 (and one for 2016!), and that income will help us keep on an even keel in 2015. Along with the irregular musical events which Alan ran for a decade (and Mike will continue next year), and the regular Playgroup & evening classes bringing in regular income, the books just about balance each year. We seem to be busier than many other village halls, and long may that continue.

## WI Italian Night

Hunton WI was relaunched in September and now has about twenty members. We meet at the Village Club on the first Tuesday of each month at 7.30pm. Last month Louise Ferns spoke to the group about fundraising for Great Ormond Street Hospital. She told us about the importance of fundraising to provide specialist equipment and to support the families of children being treated there. We held a raffle to raise funds for this worthy cause. During the evening we also enjoyed chatting to new and old friends whilst partaking of delicious homemade cake and coffee or something stronger from the bar. This month there will be a demonstration of Italian cookery. So ladies of Hunton (or further afield) please do join us on 4<sup>th</sup> November for fun, fellowship and food (d'Italia).

Children from Hunton CEP School have had an exciting time this term learning about Space. In September Borton Class visited Sky Skills Studios as part of their Mission to Mars project. The class was divided into 4 teams and collaboratively they wrote a script for a news report. Then the fun began! Each member of each team undertook the role of either producer, director, camera operator, editor or onscreen talent. The filming began in a state of the art studio with lights and £2,000 cameras. After the film was produced the class was taken on a tour around the studios and even visited the set of 'Tight Lines', a fishing programme on Sky Sports. They were shocked how small the set was – amazing what cameras can do!

This was followed at the beginning of October by a visit to the school from The Astrodome Experience, a full size theatre and planetarium that was set up in the school hall. Rowan, from Borton Class said, "The Astrodome was an amazing experience full of history and excitement. Peter who brought the Astrodome experience showed how an eclipse works and all the different types of eclipses. He did it with a model of the sun, the Earth and the moon. He shined a bright torch on the moon. Peter told us lots of facts about the planets like Jupiter. Peter showed a video of Neil Armstrong landing on the moon. This was an amazing experience and it was worth paying for it!"
