## Respected Councillor Steps Down

It was with great sadness that the Parish Council accepted the resignation of Cllr Les Leonard at its meeting on 10th November. Most people in Hunton will know Les and the contribution he has made over 10 years as a Parish Councillor. His energy, drive and above all his quick wit will mean that future parish council meetings without him will never be the same. Les has been involved in all the major developments and issues that, due to the ever-changing political and cultural scenery, your Parish Council finds itself constantly facing. His contribution towards getting the new cricket pavilion and the much-wanted footpath from the Village Hall to Bensted Close was considerable and he will be remembered for those amongst so many other achievements. He leaves us as a Parish Councillor but we know that we can continue to rely on his support and friendship in the future. We wish him well and thank him on behalf of everyone in the Parish for all that he has done for us.

### Parish Council Report

The poor condition of Hunton's roads was high on the agenda at the November meeting of the Parish Council. Cllr Ron Porter reported that representatives from KCC Highways had attended a site meeting at which he showed them particular problem areas including the potholes on Hunton Hill and collapsing road surfaces on East and West Street. The Highways officer felt that the only way to prevent the road surface alongside the playing fields from continually crumbling at the edge would be to install a kerb, but the Parish Council would be responsible for funding this. KCC are to give an estimate of the cost. Cllr Tony Stanbridge raised the issue of flooding in the dip on East Street. The flooding is largely caused by blocked drains and, although KCC clear them when the problem is reported to them, the Council will press for a more pro-active approach.

Road safety was also a matter of discussion, with parking outside the school remaining a particular problem. Cllr Steve Wyles had met again with representatives from the school and with PCSO Hunter to consider possible solutions. County Cllr Paulina Stockell felt that the issue should be elevated to county level and will speak to the cabinet member for education and arrange a site meeting with Highways.

It was agreed that the positioning of the bus stop right on the junction of Hunton Hill and East Street is dangerous for both pedestrians and motorists and that the area of hard standing recently installed does little to improve this. Cllr Stockell will speak to the relevant person at KCC to see if it can be moved to the green opposite Lughorse Lane, which was felt to be a more suitable location.

Cllr Wyles was pleased to report that speedwatch seemed to be having some effect, with a reduction in the percentage of vehicles speeding through the village, but additional volunteers were needed to assist with speed checks. The Council is to press for a blanket 30mph speed limit throughout the village.

A complaint from a member of the public about blocked public footpaths led to the suggestion that the position of Footpaths Officer be created to check regularly that public rights of way around the village are passable. This role could possibly be combined with that of Pond and Tree Warden.

Planning permission for the new cricket pavilion has been received and preliminary groundworks have commenced. The cricket club has obtained three quotations for each of the new building and the concrete base. Contractors were selected and approved by councillors. Members of the cricket club will be carrying out some of the work on the base themselves in order to reduce costs. The pavilion is expected to be completed on schedule.

The village hall car park has been resurfaced and a new picnic table and bench are now in place next to the children's play area.

## Amsbury Farm Visit...The Sequel

Following on from their tour in July of the orchards and soft fruit growing fields at Amsbury Farm, members of Hunton Gardening Club returned in November for a visit to the fruit storage and packing operation. An introductory talk from farm owner, Clive Baxter, was followed by a very informative and interesting tour conducted by Wayne Bowden, Operations Manager. The group was surprised by the detailed and varying demands from individual supermarkets as to, not only how their particular fruit is packed, but also to the exact size, colour, shape, firmness and taste of the many varieties and to the wastage that this creates. The farm also receives exceptionally short notice from the supermarkets before an order is to be collected, although they are trying to minimise the number of lorries travelling the small roads around Hunton. Following the tour Clive and Wayne answered questions and talked about the size of the operation and the huge financial investments needed to perpetually upgrade both buildings and machinery. Clive offered to host further group visits in due course.

## Responsible Dog Ownership

Many of us in the village have dogs and one of the great pleasures of living where we do is being able to walk them in such beautiful surroundings. However, it is important that we ensure they do not become a nuisance to others. I have been asked to print the following reminder:

“As a long term resident of Hunton, I would like to remind dog owners that it is their responsibility to keep control of their dogs at all times. All dogs should be kept under control in public areas and the only way to ensure that is by keeping them on a short leash. If you have been attacked or threatened by a dog in Hunton you should report it to Kent Police by calling 101. ### School Remembers Local Hero

Children from Borton Class were honoured to commemorate Remembrance Day by attending the restoration of the grave in St Mary's churchyard of their class' namesake, local First World War hero, Arthur Drummond Borton VC. Lt Col Borton, who was born at Cheveney, was awarded the Victoria Cross for "most conspicuous bravery and leadership" whilst commanding his battalion at Tel el Sheria on 7th November 1917.

The children were met at the graveside by direct descendants of Lt Colonel Borton where they viewed and were even lucky enough to take part in the restoration, which was carried out by the Victoria Cross Trust. Once the restoration was complete the assembled group took part in the two-minute silence to mark the end of the First World War.
