## Hundreds Mourn “Social Butterfly”

On 27th January St Mary's Church was filled to capacity when between six and seven hundred family and friends came to say goodbye and lay to rest local woman Nicole Parnell, 22. Nicole was taken to the church from her home in Grove Lane in a splendid horse drawn hearse followed on foot by all those that attended the beautiful service for their “social butterfly”.

Her favourite songs were played and a eulogy given by her Uncle Simon fittingly remembered her short but fun packed life with many happy and funny memories retold. Her Aunty Claire read a carefully chosen poem as the sun shone through the stained glass windows. Family and close friends then attended a committal in the churchyard opposite, which was filled with an overwhelming number of stunning floral tributes.

After the service a celebration of Nicole's life was held at the Village Hall, which had been decorated entirely with butterflies. It was early evening before everyone left having heard all her favourite music, seen her lovely pictures displayed on a large screen and remembered all the special times that they had shared with her. Many generous donations were made, which went to support the Kent Air Ambulance Service.

Nicole, who worked as a carer and had lived in Hunton all her life, died at Kings College Hospital in London after a car accident in which she suffered a serious head injury. Her car collided with a wall between Hunton Hill and Lughorse Lane on 19th December and she was taken to hospital where she spent 11 days before her parents received the sad news that no more could be done and the difficult decision was made to withdraw treatment.

Nicole passed away peacefully in the early hours of 30th December and became an organ donor, saving three people's lives so far. She leaves behind her parents, Sharon and Paul, and her three brothers, Jamie, Thomas and Jack. She will be sadly missed by her family and friends, to whom we extend our heartfelt sympathies.

## The Motherhood of God

Reflecting that this is the month of Mothering Sunday I remembered this little story that resonated with my own experience, and maybe yours, of being a mother and grandparent, living some distance away with the hope of a card, a call or a visit:

Sue was glad when the phone rang and the number it showed was her eldest son's mobile. She hadn't spoken to him for a week or so and was always glad to have a chat. She asked him how the sale of his house was going and was a bit surprised to discover that he had already moved. She would have liked to know all the details, to have a look at the new house before work on it started, maybe to help with the clearing and packing, but she knew that he and his wife liked to do things their own way and they would have managed it all perfectly well. After she put the phone down, for a moment she wondered whether she was a neglectful mother, missing whole areas of her son's life, but really she knew that it had been right to let him go, to let him manage his own life and involve her as much or as little as he wanted or needed.

This story reminds me of the pain of that mother's experience. Mary the mother of Jesus, had to watch her boy grow away from her, creating for himself a new family of followers, wilfully putting himself in danger and finally painfully executed. But Mary knew that the best thing that parents can do for their children is to let them go and do what they have to do for themselves.

God is spoken of in the Bible as a father, but also occasionally as a mother. If good human parents know that they need to let go and allow their children the freedom to grow up and make their own way, how much more must God our father, our mother, know that same truth? Sometimes we are tempted to make the parenthood of God an excuse to adopt a childish attitude to our relationship with God. We expect God to tell us what to do, to answer all our prayers and manage our life for us. As God's children, we evade our responsibilities. We go to church to be told what to think and what to do and avoid the hard work of thinking and decision-making that goes with being an adult. But God is a good parent, one who knows about giving up control and letting children grow up. God wants us to be adults, to make our own choices, even if that means we make a mess of things. Of course God also wants us to keep in touch regularly, to talk about what has gone right and what has gone wrong and to get a fresh perspective. God is still, as it were, waiting for the phone to ring!

## Road and Footpath Repairs

The Parish Council has continued to press KCC Highways for action on the many potholes that remain on village roads and this pressure has resulted in the planned closure of East Street for essential carriageway repairs (see below for details of dates and diversions). We have also been pushing KCC Public Rights of Way (PROW) for essential maintenance on the footpath from Bensted Close to the Village Hall so as to prevent the deep puddles we have seen this winter. We had been told that PROW has severe budgetary constraints, which means that no work can be done this financial year. However, by pushing further we have established that money is available for the purchase of materials, but not for the labour to carry out the work. As a result the Parish Council has agreed that it will provide the labour necessary to effect the repairs, with KCC PROW paying for the materials. If things go to plan, the repairs should have been completed by the time you are reading this.

KCC will be carrying out a programme of pre-patching works in preparation for resurfacing, which will necessitate the closure of East Street from Hunton Hill to the river bridge at Stonewall between 9.30am and 3.30pm on the following dates: Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> March and Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> March and then from Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> April for 8 days. An alternative route will be in operation via Hunton Hill, Heath Road, A229 Linton Hill, Staplehurst Road, B2079 Maidstone Road, Underlyn Lane, Hunton Road and East Street.
