Pavilion Takes Shape

Work is now well under way with construction of the new cricket pavilion. Conditional building regulations approvals were obtained in January and the foundation finished early in February. A huge vote of thanks must go to the cricket club members who turned up in the depths of winter to dig trenches, pour concrete, barrow bricks, shovel sand and hardcore and make bacon sandwiches and tea. Also to Hague Construction, who generously provided materials and plant at cost, meaning that the foundation came in well under budget; and to Hunton Engineering, who allowed us to keep valuable plant and equipment in their yard out of harm's way.



The project is now entering an exciting and challenging phase, with the first tranche of funding (£26,000) being received from Sport England early in March and the building wall panels coming to site on the 3rd of the month. A big thanks to David Heaton, who provided and drove the tractor and trailer which enabled us to get the very heavy components from the car park to the site.

As I write, the scaffolding has just been erected and the roof trusses go on in the next few days; by the end of March, the building should be watertight and we can turn our attention to fitting out internally. Some major obstacles remain, not least the challenge of providing a new power supply across the field to the pavilion, which I am sure will prove both expensive and demanding. We also have to repair the considerable damage to the outfield caused by diggers and dumpers.

We are grateful for the continuing support of the Parish Council and we welcome the involvement of the local community. Over the next few months there will be working parties most weekends and if anyone is willing to wield a shovel, hold a paintbrush or show us your considerable DIY skills this will be greatly appreciated. Our focus weekend is 11th/12th April 2015 – NatWest CricketForce weekend – when we will be not only working on the new pavilion, but trying to clear up the site in general.

The pavilion is unlikely to be fully ready until late summer but we are hoping that we can join in the village fete festivities by staging an official opening ceremony on that day. We are looking forward to celebrating this excellent new facility, which will be for the use of both the club and the village.

Spring has sprung. The evenings are lighter, the day is longer and the weather is warmer. At least that's what should be happening at this time of year – along with the April showers, which bring refreshment and energy to the growing plants. Life begins to re-emerge and things are all a little greener. (By the way, I hold that Spring begins on the date of the equinox when the earth is in the exact place in its orbit that the day and night are equal - March 20th this year - not March 1st which the weather forecasters seem to have adopted.)

Poets have long been inspired by the coming of spring, perhaps none more so than Alfred Lord Tennyson who penned these words in his poem of 1835, Locksley Hall.

*"In the Spring a fuller crimson comes upon the robin's breast;
In the Spring the wanton lapwing gets himself another crest;
In the Spring a livelier iris changes on the burnish'd dove;
In the Spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love."*

Plato wrote that with a touch of lover, everyone becomes a poet. Others have written or said things about love too – some of which are intended to raise a smile. Mae West for example is reported to have said, "Love thy neighbour — and if he happens to be tall, debonair and devastating, it will be that much easier." George Burns said that, "Love is a lot like a backache, it doesn't show up on X-rays, but you know it's there."

The church's season at this time of year is Easter, and love is at the very heart of the season. We recall that Jesus said that greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. Which is exactly what he did. He gave up his life for his friends. Who are his friends? That's the whole world – including you and me. This is not love that is a fancy thought made lightly, or an amusing anecdote or quote, but love as deep as it gets. My favourite hymn is "When I survey the wondrous cross" and my favourite lines from that hymn are "see, from his head, his hands, his feet, sorrow and love flow mingled down. Did e'er such love and sorrow meet?" Jesus models love for us, and calls us to reflect his love in our relationships with others. The greatest commandment, he tells us, is to love God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength, and love your neighbour as yourself. Happy Easter!

Village Lunches

The recent series of five lunches were again very well supported, with a mixture of regulars and occasional visitors enjoying a chat in a friendly atmosphere over a delicious, locally prepared meal. A huge thank you to Lesley for all her hard work in organising and running the events, (although she will very modestly deny that it was much effort on her behalf), the talented soup makers and cake bakers of the village for their wonderful creations, Rosemary for manning the bar each week, those who helped with serving, clearing up and providing lifts, and perhaps most importantly to everyone who came along to enjoy the lunches, thereby ensuring their success. Donations from the five weeks totalled just over £700, which will benefit the Village Club and St Mary's Church.

Parish Council Report

Councillors welcomed Herschel Santineer, Chair of Governors at Hunton School, to the parish council meeting in March. Mr Santineer reported that the school was outperforming other schools in Kent and nationally. A new middle school teacher will be joining after Easter. The governing body is working hard to build a better relationship with the community and is looking at initiatives to improve the parking situation and engage parents with the village. Mr Santineer invited councillors to visit the school.

The Council have asked KCC to impose a 30mph limit throughout the village; a vehicle count and speed survey will be required before this can be considered. KCC have agreed to install coloured blocks on the road surface in West Street near to the bakery and South Lodge as a traffic calming measure. Speedwatch have recruited a new member and will be carrying out checks in the area. Cllr Stockell will ask KCC to install an anti-skid surface at the bottom of Hunton Hill, following four accidents in 30 days. Councillors gave the go ahead for kerbing alongside the playing field on West Street; KCC have agreed to fund half the cost.

The footpath between the village hall and Bensted Close has been repaired (single-handedly by Cllr Heaton). A contractor is being sought to spray the weeds.

Cllr Stanbridge will look into ways to improve broadband provision in the village.

There were reports of two burglaries in the village in recent weeks. Residents are asked to be extra vigilant and to report any concerns to Huntonwatch or the police.

The village hall is very busy with regular use by the pre-school and judo club, the spring music events and bookings for 17 weddings this year and next. There are plans to replace the curtains and blinds. Work will be undertaken on 12th April to complete the levelling of the car park.

Having Your Say at the Consultation Café

Hunton held its first village consultation event for its Neighbourhood Plan at the village club on 21st March. The response was very good; over 50 completed questionnaires and the graffiti wall filled with comments. It is very important that we get as much input from as many residents as possible. If you have not had the opportunity to comment yet there is still plenty of time. You can pick up a questionnaire at the Gardening Club Supper on 31st March; Pop-Up Shops on 4th & 25th April, 23rd May; contact Cllrs Porter, Wyles or Trought who will arrange to deliver a questionnaire to you directly; or send your views to Huntonnp@gmail.com. Progress will be reported to the village via the Hunton Herald.
