Around 20 volunteers took part in the first litter pick of the year on 28th March. Forests, Theme Parks and More...

The children of Hunton Primary School had a very busy time leading up to their Easter break. Devas class had a wonderful day exploring the beautiful grounds of Bedgebury Pinetum to celebrate their Spring topic. The children were able to learn all about the trees, spot the signs of Spring and immerse themselves in a full sensory experience of the forest. They even met the Gruffalo! Bannerman class enjoyed Africa day where the children learnt about African instruments and were able to play the drums, making an exciting African beat. They had the opportunity to listen to tribal music and sing and dance along to it. They also made their own African necklaces in a jewellery-making workshop.

Porteous and Borton classes had a very exciting trip to Chessington World of Adventures as the culmination of their learning in the topic of Thrills & Spills where they studied the historical and scientific facts of theme parks and rides.

Borton Class carried out fundraising activities as part of the Apprentice Project, with each group being given £5 to invest in resources with the aim of earning as much profit as possible. Events included: a carrot treasure hunt; a car wash for staff; pie throwing; a lemonade sale; a talent show and a cake and refreshment stall (including cake making competition). The team made a profit of £82, which will go to reducing the cost of their residential trip in June.

This month's pastoral letter draws upon resources from Christians in Politics. I attended a fascinating workshop at the Spring Harvest Conference in April facilitated by CiP. More details from www.christiansinpolitics.org.uk

When you read this, the UK will be about to go to the polls for one of the most hotly contested elections in living memory. Yet many Christians are ambivalent about it. Some people think that politics and faith don't mix, but some would say that misunderstands God's nature. If your God is not interested in politics then you are not worshipping the God of the Bible. Take the Lord's Prayer for example. In it we pray that God's Kingdom would come - that is a politically loaded prayer. It is asking that the reign of God would come to fruition here on earth as it is currently in heaven. We pray not that souls would escape up to heaven, but for God's kingly reign to invade our world. Of course, politics is far more than voting in general elections. We seek God's reign for every second of our Christian lives, not just for one day every five years. So in one sense voting is the very least we can do. It is us, as believers, playing our part in the democratic process that we have been invited to participate in. Here are 10 reasons why Christians should vote

1. Voting publicly recognises that we submit to the authority of the political system in our nation as established by God.
2. Voting recognises the equality of all people and their right to speak and be heard.
3. It is one way that we can obey God's command to seek the good of those around us and our nation as a whole.
4. It shows that we care deeply about who our leaders are as we are urged to offer prayer and intercession on their behalf.
5. It is a simple yet significant way we can do something about politics in our nation. 'All that is required for evil to prevail is for good men to do nothing', Edmund Burke.
6. It makes a difference the way a grain of salt makes a difference, and that is how we are to influence our society for good.
7. It is a privilege not to be taken for granted. Those of us who reap the benefits of living in a democracy should play a part in upholding democracy.
8. Not voting is a form of voting, as it will influence the outcome. We need to take responsibility for our actions, as well as our lack of actions.
9. Voting has biblical precedence for example Acts 14:23 describes that the early Christians elected elders by voting.
10. Voting is part of our stewardship to use all the resources we have been given in ways that honour God; to waste a vote is to squander a gift.

And beyond that, politics matters. It determines our life from the moment we wake up to the moment we go to bed. It affects our homes, our jobs, our welfare and our families.

While we understand that politics matters, sometimes we can't see how what happens in an old building in Westminster affects us... or how we can affect it. Getting involved, no matter what your party politics, at a local level or wider, is a real act of commitment and service.

This month's who's who features **Phil Nichols**, Chairman of Hunton Village Club.

"I landed in Hunton direct from a flight from South Africa where I had been investigating the sinking of a passenger cruise ship as part of my work in marine and transport insurance. During my short stay in South Africa, my wife, Tricia, had been house hunting. She collected me at Heathrow and then immediately showed me round several houses, saving the Hunton house to last. The rest is history and we moved in, from Barming, with our son, Richard, in February 1992.

Before long we joined the Sports and Social Committee of the village hall (now the Village Hall Committee) and became involved in organising all kinds of functions including reintroducing the village fete, until interest eventually waned. Of course there is now a new, vibrant committee that has reincarnated the fete again and I get involved by being the guy behind the microphone.

I joined the Village Club in 1996, around that time also playing cricket for Hunton CC and petanque for the White House pub. For the Village Millennium Party at the hall a sound system was purchased and I subsequently became resident DJ providing gratis music at a number of functions at the hall and other venues. I became Chairman of Hunton Village Club in 2012 and am currently also acting secretary. I think the club is a great asset for the village and hope the community will continue to support it.

I retired last May after 47 years with the same company and, whilst I miss my colleagues, I am too busy with my many interests, including model cars, trains, motor sport and fishing, to miss the work. There are also other village activities, such as the walking group, to keep me occupied. Hunton is a remarkable little village with a wonderful active community and I count myself as most fortunate in being part of it."
