Likewise, the number of insects worldwide had fallen by 45 per cent since the Seventies, while human populations had almost doubled.

## Hunton's Who's Who

This month's Who's Who focuses on Gary Thomas, the new Chairman of the parish council.

Born and raised in Hampton Hill in Middlesex, Gary's association with Kent began in 1970 when he moved to Boxley. He quickly involved himself in the local community, joining Boxley Parish Council, of which he was Chairman during a particularly challenging period that saw the building of the Walderslade Woods development, Grove Green and the Channel Tunnel Rail Link, all within the parish. His background in engineering proved very useful when the parish council successfully fought for alterations to the design of the rail link in order to minimise the impact on the Boxley valley. He was also a borough councillor for Maidstone from the late 70's until 1988, sitting on the planning committee as well as having particular involvement in housing and transport.

Gary moved to Hunton with his family in 1996 and has served on the parish council since 2002. He is heavily involved with CPRE (the Campaign to Protect Rural England), as the Chair of the Kent branch from 2003-08 and currently the Chair of the Maidstone branch. It will therefore come as no surprise that Gary's desire for the future of our beautiful, rural village is that it should remain largely unchanged; he particularly values Hunton's sense of community and its extensive network of public footpaths. He spends much of his leisure time gardening and restoring his classic cars.



## West Street Closure

West Street will be closed from 3<sup>rd</sup> August for up to five days.

The road will be closed between East Street and the Village Hall to install a new kerbline.

## Hunton Hill Collision

There has been another serious head-on collision on our village roads, the second in two months. Two cars collided on the bends on Hunton Hill at lunchtime on 2<sup>nd</sup> July and, although both vehicles were severely damaged, fortunately there were no reported injuries. The road remained closed until 5.30pm whilst an oil spill was cleared.

## Parish Council Roundup

The hedge along the playing fields will be trimmed back to improve vision when exiting the car park. Due to the increase in events the waste bins are in need of more regular emptying. There have been issues with parking when events at the village hall and playing fields have coincided – this is being looked into. The drainage system at the village hall has been blocked by wet wipes again. The trenching to install the electric cabling to the cricket pavilion will take place on 27<sup>th</sup> July. The interior decorations and electrics are almost finished and the plumbing will be done soon; the pavilion should be completed by the beginning of September. Annette Trought has taken over from Christina Harrison as Chair of the Village Hall Committee.

The pre-school have purchased a defibrillator; the playing field committee, the Hunton Herald and the parish council will fund the purchase and installation of a cabinet to put it in, which will probably be mounted on the outside of the football club changing rooms.

Herschel Santineer, Chair of Governors at Hunton School, reported that the recent SATS results had exceeded government targets. The school hopes to have over 100 children for the first time, based on applications received. He had put a personal message in the school newsletter asking parents to park safely and considerately and to use the village hall car park wherever possible.

Speedwatch has three new members and a meeting is planned to discuss strategies and dates. No crimes have been reported in the village recently although there have been a number of burglaries in surrounding villages. Huntonwatch gained three new members from its stall at the fete.

The Kent Association of Local Councils (KALC) has disputed MBCs housing target figure of over 18,000 properties, questioning their methodology. It has put forward a reduced figure of around 10,000. In the event that KALC seek a judicial review, the parish council agreed to support this with funding of an estimated maximum of £1,000.

## Flood Risk

At the Parish Council meeting on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> July, Neil Gunn from the Environment Agency (EA) gave a presentation and answered questions on the EA findings from their investigation into the 2013 floods. He also set out in broad terms what the EA is planning to put in place for future flood relief. He was accompanied by Geraldine Brown (Chair of Yalding Parish Council), with whom he has been working on those plans. At this time Mr Gunn was unable to go into any detail of what may be planned other than to give a broad timeframe for the project as follows:

- Now - early investigation into potential options
- May 2016—February 2017 - outline design
- May 2017 - Submission of business case to DEFRA
- 2018 - Detailed design
- 2019 - 2022 - Construction

Many properties and land in Hunton are under threat of flooding. Projections suggest that global warming and other factors may increase that threat. Because of this your Parish Council is seeking to form a close working relationship with both the Environment Agency and Yalding PC on this crucial piece of work.

The first action we are taking is to ask Hunton residents to let us know if their house or land was affected by the flooding at Christmas 2013 and into 2014 and at any time previously (2000 being the other major flood in Hunton). This is to ensure that the Environment Agency have the correct information on the database that they will be using to explore potential options. It is essential to update this information as we were informed by Mr Gunn that in 2000 only one property in Hunton was flooded - clearly not the case. ## Oil Deliveries

As the Hunton oil syndicate is no longer in operation following Louise's departure from the village, I have been looking at alternatives. I recently came across The Oil Club [www.oil-club.co.uk](http://www.oil-club.co.uk). This is an independent organisation that does not have any links to its suppliers. It runs a large number of local heating oil clubs around the country with Hunton being grouped into a club together with West Farleigh. Deliveries to our village are currently taking place twice a month. I tried them out recently and was very happy with the service and the price (33.99p/litre), which was cheaper than that being quoted by Butler Fuels and Boiler Juice. The club is free to join, currently has 38 members and works in much the same way as our village syndicate did. I asked them to clarify their business model and received this reply:

"We operate like a reverse Ebay. Suppliers bid for the business and once they have won they will pay the club a fee based on the size of order. We also have the shop and adverts on the site. Suppliers have to join the club and do so on the basis that they must supply the club a competitive group rate at all times - not just the summer months. If they do so they will be included in the summer orders. We now manage around 50 million litres a year for our members across the UK and as the members increase so the suppliers take us more seriously with good rates and better services. For the first time this year, we fined a number of suppliers for late delivery over the winter months and this improved customer service from those suppliers noticeably. They can't afford to lose the business now and we can only do this due to the order levels - so the more members the better all-round."

Whilst looking into the various options I discovered that a number of our local suppliers are just different brand names for Certas Energy UK Ltd (formerly GB Oils), namely Emo, Butler, Pace, Southern Counties, CPL and Team Flitwick as well as the website heatingoil.co.uk. Also Boiler Juice, which started out as an independent price comparison, was taken over by GB Oils for a period until the Office of Fair Trading got involved. It is now being run independently again by the original founders.
