



Hunton Wanderers CC End of Season Report

The 2015 season has generally been a success for the cricket club; both the Saturday 1st team and the Sunday XI competed well in their respective leagues and both finished 3rd, narrowly missing promotion. The Saturday 1st XI were desperately unlucky, missing out on promotion by just four points on the last day of the season and despite winning their final game. For the Sunday XI it was a clearer picture; they had lost their chance of promotion some two games earlier, but nonetheless defeated Higham & Mockbeggar, placed 2nd, on the last day of the season, again falling short by that tantalising four points. Had it not been for rain-affected fixtures earlier in the season, against theoretically weaker opposition, the side would have almost certainly gone up to Kent Village League division 4. As for the Saturday 2nd XI, they finished a creditable mid table against some difficult opposition.

The new pavilion is almost complete; the carpets are in, decoration has been finished and the electricity is due to be connected soon. We hope to hold a proper grand opening at the beginning of the 2016 season. More news to follow!

You may remember how sad the outfield looked at the beginning of the season, after the diggers and dumpers had churned it up laying the pavilion foundation last winter. I am pleased to report that it has made almost a full recovery, and with a bit of seeding and rolling this winter, will be back to its full green glory next year. Our thanks go to the parish council for their continuing support with the pavilion project and we hope that the whole village will be proud of its new asset.

Hunton Neighbourhood Plan Autumn Update 2015



Why are we doing this?

Neighbourhood Planning provides the opportunity for communities to set out a positive vision of how they wish their community to develop over the next ten, fifteen or even twenty years and to play a much stronger role in shaping and influencing the way in which that vision is achieved. Our starting point was the Parish Plan drawn up five years ago but as we go forward it is critical that we have a clear understanding of what YOU want for Hunton now and in the future. Hunton's Neighbourhood Plan will sit alongside Maidstone Borough Council's Local Plan and both will be taken into account when assessing, for example, planning applications and improvements to infrastructure.

This interim report has been prepared using the numerous contributions made by so many of you. The questions we posed and the opportunities we gave you to answer them have yielded sufficient and sound material for us to issue this update now. We are extremely grateful for your input.

Village Input

For the first phase of our engagement strategy our approach was to try to establish what was important to Hunton residents by asking five simple questions:

1. What do you like about Hunton?
2. What do you dislike about Hunton?
3. What would you change in Hunton?
4. What would you not change in Hunton?
5. What must we protect in Hunton?

We were delighted with the results. We received 1,295 comments through the Consultation Café, the various Graffiti Wall opportunities or via e-mail to the dedicated huntonnp@gmail.com address. We also had the Graffiti Wall available outside the school on two occasions to allow parents to have their say.


We received input from over 65 households - which equates to around 20% of the village. This compares very favourably with other villages nearby, where response levels were struggling to reach 10% of households.

More work will be carried out over the coming months to drill down into key areas and to allow us to produce the first draft of our Neighbourhood Plan, but an initial analysis of the massive amount of input received gives us a good feel for what is important to the village.


Initial Findings

Analysis of the input received has thrown up some interesting insights into what Hunton residents feel. Answers to some questions showed a spread of opinion which covered many topics whilst other questions evoked much more focussed responses. For each category we have shown the ten most frequently mentioned topics in graphical form overleaf.

What do you like about Hunton? - 415 responses covered 57 topics. The most frequently mentioned was 'Community Spirit' (9.2% of the responses). 'Peace and quiet' (6.7%) and 'the countryside' (6.3%) were next. The top 5 items accounted for 33.7% of responses.



What do you dislike about Hunton? - 265 responses covered 50 topics. The most frequently mentioned were 'road conditions/potholes' and 'speeding traffic' - each 15.5% of the responses. 'Fly tipping and rubbish' (9.8%), big lorries/buses' (9.1%) and 'school parking' (8.7%) were also mentioned frequently. The top 5 accounted for 58.5% of responses.




What would you change in Hunton? - 221 responses covered 61 topics. 'Speed control/traffic calming' (12.7%) and 'school parking' (11.8%) were top of the list. The top five topics accounted for 38.9% of the responses.



What would you not change in Hunton? - 173 responses to this question covered 35 topics. The top five accounted for 49.7% of the responses with 'countryside/landscape' (13.3%) and 'rural feel/nature of the village' (12.7%) the top two.



What must we protect in Hunton? - 221 responses covered 36 topics and the top five accounted for 43% of the responses. The most frequently mentioned was protection 'against inappropriate development' (12.2%) with 'St Mary's Church' (10.0%) a close second. The top five topics accounted for 43% of responses.



Analysis of findings

The findings given in this report are based upon the things you told us and, wherever possible, using your own words. That in itself makes the information extremely valuable. However, in order to use this to formulate our Neighbourhood Plan, more analysis is required and we will need to start looking at how topics you have mentioned might be connected.

For example, when you told us what you liked about Hunton phrases such as 'community spirit', 'friendly people', 'village events' were used and specific examples such as 'the pop up shop', 'the music events', 'the Christmas fayre' and 'the fete' were also mentioned. These might all be considered to be part of a wider 'sense of community' topic. Similarly, 'speeding traffic', 'road conditions/potholes', 'school parking' and 'big lorries/buses' could all fall into a wider 'Roads and Transport' topic to be addressed.

What is clear is that there is still much to be done.

What Next?

We will need to consult with the village and its stakeholders again. This time to find out what the village wants to identify as its priorities, to consider what we must strive to preserve and protect and envision how the village should look in 20 years time. For example there will be important and detailed questions to consider around what if any development should be carried out within Hunton. Is there a need for a small amount of additional affordable housing; and if so where should it be located? Does the village want to preserve the Village Hall and the Village Club? Does the community want to encourage more visitors from elsewhere to use these facilities? What else could they be used for? We will also be contacting specific groups who have not had the chance to contribute yet. Early next spring we will organise a series of workshops and open events. There will be more information in the Hunton Herald in the New Year about these.

October saw the consultation period for the Maidstone Local Plan. The information yielded from the village so far has proven very useful to the Parish Council in terms of formulating Hunton's input. Not only that, but the concerns raised about traffic and the school helped to support efforts to make the advisory 20mph speed limit outside Hunton and all other local primary schools a permanent one during relevant school hours and the hope now is that this might become a mandatory speed limit in the not too distant future.

Bringing our Neighbourhood Plan into force

There is a well-defined and formal approach that must be followed.

The proposed Neighbourhood Plan will be submitted to Maidstone Borough Council, which will check that proper procedures have been followed in its preparation. This includes, for example, the documentation of all the processes and checks used when gathering information and ensuring that Hunton residents are kept informed of progress.

Following a period of wider publicity, Maidstone Borough Council will arrange for an independent examination of the plan to ensure that it has met specific legal requirements. Once it has passed this scrutiny there will be a public referendum in the village. If at least 50% of those attending the referendum vote yes, the plan will be accepted.

The Neighbourhood Plan is being created on behalf of Hunton Parish Council with a sub-committee of councillors taking responsibility for the work. Village Hall Drainage Issues

Thank you to the hirers and playing field users for their patience and stoicism whilst we have been having drainage/odour issues at the hall over the summer. As many have noticed, the sewage treatment system has malfunctioned often during 2014/15, sometimes due to hirers flushing things down the system that it can't cope with, sometimes from vandalism, but chiefly because the treatment plant fitted in 1999 hadn't had any parts replaced nor been cleaned out for many years. Eventually the whole innards collapsed onto themselves in July, and it all had to be rebuilt and re-commissioned over six weeks, once we got a mini-digger round the back to excavate around the unit and jetted the drains. Thanks to the various volunteers who helped with the operations, and cleared up when requested.

Fingers crossed, it is all now operating happily again, and we have a service contract and schedule for de-sludging to follow, plus some new fencing to come, which might stop school kids exploring where there is live equipment (even with CCTV observing them!). Inevitably, all this work has cost us a fair bit, over a thousand pounds to date with more bills to come, but the Hall should smell a bit more sweetly again.

Christine Etheridge gave a fascinating and lively account of her career in pearls to the ladies of the WI. She began as a 16 year old apprentice in Garrard's Pearl Room where it was quickly recognised that she had the right attributes to become a pearl stringer. She explained the intricacies of cleaning, drying, stringing and conserving pearls, with the importance of the knotting between individual pearls. She showed many example of her work as well as some disastrous treatment of pearls – including using superglue to stick the finished silk. She explained the differences between seawater, freshwater, cultivated, cultured, coin and synthetic pearls. During her talk she deftly restrung a necklace of pearls.

Some members of Hunton WI went on a coach outing to Bletchley Park, which was organised by the District WI. It was a very interesting day, exploring this historic place, which finished with a tea hosted by Stoney Stratford WI.
