



## Lorry Crashes into School Entrance

A concrete mixing lorry crashed into the metal safety railings at the pedestrian entrance to Hunton Primary School on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> September. It seems the wheel of the lorry became entangled in the severely damaged railings, causing the driver to lose control and forcing the lorry up on to the verge where it went on to demolish part of the hedge alongside the school playground and beyond, together with the 30mph sign. The lorry was travelling to Amsbury Farm with a full load of concrete and the driver, together with his colleague who was travelling in the vehicle behind him, were said to be very shaken as they had feared the lorry would tip over under the weight of the concrete it was carrying. The police were contacted but as the driver returned to the scene to leave his details and no one was injured, it was not considered to be a police matter.



It was extremely fortunate that this occurred at around 11am when the road was relatively quiet and not at school drop off or pick up time, when the outcome could have been considerably more serious.

This incident highlights the very real danger of the increasing number of heavy goods vehicles using our narrow village roads, despite the extensive 7.5 tonne weight limits, an issue that has concerned many within the village for some time. The parish council were coincidentally already due to discuss the matter of HGVs and road safety at their meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> September, and following the incident asked concerned residents to attend the meeting to share their views. A report of the meeting will follow in the November Herald.

## Pastoral Letter

By the time you read this we will be celebrating and giving thanks for the Harvest. The starting point for Harvest has always been a veneration of and thanksgiving for the natural created order of things. Although the Old Testament prescribes a feast to celebrate the first fruits of the harvest and another to celebrate the ingathering of the threshing floor and the winepress, the church does not appear to have observed any such festivals until relatively recent times. The Ember Days of June, September and December were agricultural in origin, and very probably related to the pagan observances of Rome at the time of sowing and harvests of corn and wine; but in Christian liturgy these have always been observed as fasts. However, Lammas (loaf mass: 1 August) has been observed in England from Saxon times and throughout the Middle Ages with the blessing of bread made from the first ripe corn.

In the Book of Common Prayer (1662) no mention is made of Harvest Thanksgiving. A special prayer of thanksgiving for an abundant harvest was first officially provided for use after the General Thanksgiving in 1796. Similar provision was made at intervals for the next fifty years, whenever the abundance of the harvest seemed to justify it. This led to the belief that such an observance should be made regularly. It was about this period that most of the popular harvest thanksgiving hymns were written. Today the festival is recognised and provided for in prayer books of the Church of England and elsewhere.

Even in the most urban of parishes both the tradition and attraction of decorating the church for Harvest is strong and popular. A need to give thanks for the fruits of the harvest is, quite rightly, deep-rooted in the hearts and minds of most worshipping Christians.

Harvest Thanksgivings have changed in recent years. An awareness of global and environmental issues has highlighted more of the challenges associated with modern farming and agriculture. Our knowledge of what conditions are like elsewhere can also tarnish something of the 'rosy glow' we can feel when it comes to Harvest, when the questions around world hunger, starvation, gross inequality, food surpluses and international debt come into focus. Yet being thankful can also spur us into action to help others less fortunate.

## Polý Kaló Food Tasting at the WI

Our September speaker was unable to come to our meeting and Sue Hollins kindly stepped in at late notice to demonstrate Greek cookery. After some facts about Greece, which apparently has between 1,200 and 6,000 islands, Sue discussed the healthy Mediterranean diet with lots of fresh food, olive oil and herbs. Sue used liberal amounts of oil in all her dishes when she demonstrated several recipes, including quick 'hob to table' moussaka. This included a jar of aubergines – which like several of the ingredients used was only available from Lidl! The moussaka was followed by a Greek salad, tzatziki and omeleta horiatiki (village omelette). Then for desert, baklava (strictly speaking a Turkish dish) and galaktoboureko, a semolina custard baked in filo pastry. As Sue refused to take any of the food home, we all had to tuck in! It was delicious, so it was no great hardship and left very little room for our usual cake and coffee. We all appreciated Sue coming along at short notice, and providing a most enjoyable evening.
