This year the format of our Christmas Fair was changed to include activities for children and expanded to take in the village hall as well as St Mary's Church and churchyard. The fair was underwritten by the Village Events Committee allowing us to invest in decorations for Santa's grotto, a snow machine and to arrange a visit from Santa himself. Feedback has been extremely positive and many stallholders have already asked about reserving a place for this year's fair, several reporting record takings. Around 300 people attended the festivities, Santa was kept busy and there was a buzz in the air. The lantern parade was well supported and the snow machine offered many a photo opportunity with the magical backdrops of the lit churchyard and new hall lights. Now that the dust has settled we are very pleased to report that, after costs, we raised some £233 for the Friends of St Mary's, £380 for St Mary's Church and have a balance of £139 which will be used to underwrite the 2018 fair.

Pastoral Letter

The English language is considered to be one of the most difficult to learn, due to several factors relating to grammar, spelling and pronunciation. The main reason however, is the large number of idiomatic structures we use in everyday speech and writing. These idioms mostly stem from ancient uses of the language, and are often metaphorical. How about “letting the cat out of the bag”, “burning the candle at both ends”, “to pull someone’s leg”, “pie in the sky”, for example?

Many of the idioms we use have their roots in the Bible (with Shakespeare coming a close second!) “The writing is on the wall”, “to see eye to eye”, “thorn in the flesh”, “two-edged sword”, “as old as the hills”, “give up the ghost”, “the blind leading the blind” – just a few examples from several hundred in the Bible. It might be assumed that they originate from the King James translation, but in fact the majority are drawn from the several English versions of the Bible that were circulating in the previous 130 years or so.

Even though we might not find the exact words in the Bible translations we have now, what has survived is the use of the language and the message the words convey, albeit in an idiomatic way. Language is a powerful tool, and often not used to best effect – whether an inane tweet, an unkind comment on a Facebook post, a terse e-mail, or even an over-complicated sermon!

“Think before you speak” is always good advice. When speaking to someone whose first language isn’t English, the use of idioms is particularly confusing. In our everyday language we may use idioms to try and make what we’re saying more palatable in some way, such as “she’s passed on”, “he’s away with the fairies”, when in fact it can be kinder to be more precise with our words.

The Bible reminds us that words have incredible power. For example, it warns against having a “sharp tongue”: “Evildoers sharpen their tongues like swords and aim cruel words like deadly arrows” (Psalm 64 verse 3). Instead we should consider what we say: “The one who has knowledge uses words with restraint” (Proverbs 27), and follow the advice of St Paul (Ephesians 4 verse 29): “Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen.”

February Fair Maids

The Snowdrop, also known as Fair Maids of February: *Galanthus nivalis* and *Galanthus elwesii*, symbolises hope and new beginnings and is the flower of birthdays for January and February. Regarded by many as a wildflower, snowdrops were not recorded as growing wild in the UK until the 1770s. Most colonies are probably garden escapees though it is still thought some may be native, particularly in the southwest of England.

David and Anke Way (residents in the village until 2012) discovered a vigorous form of *Galanthus elwesii* naturalized in Hunton in 2003. This has become known as the "Hunton Giant" and is believed to have been introduced to the Hunton Rectory between 1866 and 1892. The first imports of the species began as wild gathered bulbs from Turkey and it is possible that the "Hunton Giant" is a survivor from that era. It has broad strap like leaves and stems that hold the average sized flowers above the foliage and can be seen in Hunton churchyard around the mounting block to the right of the main entrance to the church.

"*Galanthus*" is Greek and means "milk-white flower" and the Latin *nivalis* means "resembling snow". The snowdrops, in producing their own heat actually melt the snow around them. The hundreds of cultivated varieties include giant, double and rare yellow kinds, some of which change hands for significant sums. Most colonies in the UK reproduce by division of the bulbs and not by seed.

Did you know...rumour has it, that when Adam and Eve were expelled from the Garden of Eden, Eve was about to give up hoping that winter would ever end. An angel then appeared and transformed some of the snowflakes into snowdrop flowers, showing her that cold winter eventually gives way to spring season, thus snowdrops became a symbol of hope.

...Snowdrops was also British slang for the American military police in the second world war, because of the white helmets they wore.

Don't miss the wonderful display of snowdrops in the churchyard right now. Large swathes of diminutive pure white flowers are carpeted around the churchyard in drifts and it is well worth a walk along the path around the Church to see their clean white single flowers nodding on their strong stems.

Village Hall Gig News

Well, what good fun the several families had at **Wind in the Willows** after Xmas – we almost sold out the 90 seats (although we still had some mulled wine left, and lots of mince pies!), and it was great to see young faces lit up by the Box Tale Soup company's puppets and especially Mr Toad. Like the Sonrisa latin-esque music in November, which was also well attended, these events wouldn't be possible without Applause Rural Touring subsidising them.

As there aren't any musical events planned this winter at the Hall, it might be useful to have a bit of background about Applause (of which Mike is a Trustee, representing promoters on the charity board), because they have been helping Hunton put rural performances on for over a decade now. Applause is a small (3/4-person) arts organisation based in Southborough that provides a roster of musical and artistic events across Kent, Sussex & Surrey, and is funded by local and county council and also national Arts Council grants; it also provides outdoor performers in the summer, which our village fete regularly use (for a rather small fee). It also tends to get national and international musicians, who it can guarantee to provide a run of three weekend (or even a full week's) gigs; many years ago, we had some substantial overseas stars booked by Alan Bishop - like Seckou Keita from Senegal and Carmen Souza from Cape Verde. Applause have just been awarded a substantial grant, in association with Creative Arts East (Essex/ Anglia), to take spoken word performances into rural pubs and clubs for the next three years – Inn Crowd. You can see further details, and scheduled events on www.applause.org.uk and www.inncrowd.org.uk. Like many of the people who come from Farleigh, Loose and Boughton to see Applause events in Hunton, anyone can book to see these events at other village halls; Mike's been to Robertsbridge, Frittenden, Lower Halstow and Catsfield to see bands.

Financially, Applause pay the performer's full fee, and we have to guarantee a minimum amount (normally about half the fee) and then share any door takings above that minimum; the councils' funding (your rates and taxes!) covers the 'gap'. Generally, we need to sell about 40 tickets to reach that minimum, which we tend to do most times, and which Alan used to manage easily. Applause cannot fund every event, and have to divvy out their bookings to other halls, generally favouring those where they get borough or district funding (which Maidstone do, but some don't) – we tend to get two a year, plus the fete. This year, we were lucky to get three events, with the Spanish quartet back in January. They don't make a big profit for hall funds, circa. £100-200 per event (half of that being bar profits), which covers the hall hire essentially, but the hall trustees feel they're worthwhile. As mentioned earlier, there's nothing booked while the panto season gets underway, so our kitchen and bar volunteers can get a well-earned rest (as can the stage and PA erectors), but we have a couple of gigs pencilled in for May 21st and October 27th, with previous Applause-funded performers returning at their special request...**Hannah Scott** (new CD) and **Will Pound** (with Inlay). For those who remember **Trackdogs**, the Madrid-based Irish American trumpet-led quartet, they are returning to Cobham Church (a lovely venue) on April 5th and Maidstone's Pizza Express (less atmospheric!) on May 25th.
