## 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Party

Residents along with past and present Trustees of Peace Cottages Almshouses were joined by family and friends for a celebration tea to mark the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Almshouse Association. Festive bunting, tea in pretty vintage cups, copious amounts of cake and glasses of wine all added to the celebration. There were nearly thirty guests at the tea in Hunton Club who, judging by the levels of conversation and laughter, thoroughly enjoyed their afternoon together.

The Rev Peter Callway gave a short history of Peace Cottages that were founded in 1899 originally 'to provide a home for aged and infirm members of the Church of England'. The Almshouse Association came into being in 1946 and continues to provide guidance and support to more than 1600 almshouse charities including those in Hunton. Events to celebrate their 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary are being held in many towns and villages to raise awareness of the existence of almshouses and the social housing they provide.

Peace Cottages in West Street has five residents and is currently run by a team of six volunteer Trustees.

## Hunton Bowls Club News

It has been another challenging season for the Bowls Club so the arrival of our new sign lifted our spirits somewhat. Bernard Hill, a retired gentleman from Coxheath designed the sign. Bernard had been working on the project since before the first lockdown and, you can imagine, involved an incredible amount of skilled workmanship that resulted in this superb sign. When next you are at the playing field please take a closer look at this masterpiece which depicts a bowl, a jack inscribed with the bowls club’s founded date of 1936 and the green all painted in the club’s colours.

We were lucky that the majority of our members returned at the beginning of the season after what we can only describe as a non-starter in 2020. As restrictions sufficiently eased in May we were able to commence with our friendly matches against other clubs, Weald League, Friday Night Men’s Triples, Ladies Maidstone & District Triples and our own Competitions have all been played - quite like ‘old times’ once again! However, we are still very short of playing members and it has been somewhat difficult at times to fill the required teams resulting in matches having to be cancelled.

In June we welcomed the easing of restrictions on inside catering but social distancing remained. To overcome this rule the four tables were distributed between the pavilion and the two changing rooms where tea and biscuits were served at half time. We had to forego the raffle and the captain’s speech for this season at least. Will our full teas with sandwiches and cake return? I’m not too sure – now might be the time to break with tradition.

Once again this season we have had the pleasure to play on a superb green which, as always, we thank Colin our green keeper and his team of men for all their hard work. Of course the most important piece of equipment for any pitch or green is a mower and sadly our Dennis cylinder mower is in desperate need of replacement. We believe the mower to be at least 30 years old and purchased second-hand from Loose Bowls Club for a cost of £400. It has been well maintained over the years and has been fitted with numerous spare parts but now is beyond repair. Unfortunately, we have been unable to organise any of our usual fund raising events this season due to social distancing and money is very tight at this point in time to say the least. The cost of a Dennis power unit plus a bladed cylinder cassette will be in the region of £6,000 and our aim is to secure enough money in the coming months by way of grants and donations to purchase the mower before the start of the new season in April.

We are rapidly coming to the end of another season with just a few friendly matches to play so if you are passing by please feel free to come in and watch a game. ## Swift Word About Swifts

Firstly, how do you know they are swifts and not swallows or martins? At this time of year the hirundines (that's swallows, house martins and sand martins) and swifts triple or quadruple their numbers with the addition of all this season's offspring. Dozens or even hundreds are often seen perching on overhead wires. If you are lucky enough to witness this locally you can be absolutely certain of one thing: you are not looking at swifts! They are swallows and/or martins – probably house martins as we have fewer sand martins hereabouts.

The scientific name for the swift is *apus*; this was the bird's Latin name and translates as 'without a foot'. Although swifts do have feet on the end of very short legs, they are only functional for clinging onto the side of a rock face or stone building, for example. They are not able to perch on a twig or wire. It's not really surprising that a bird that spends its whole life in the air (sleeping and even mating on the wing) has evolved by reducing the size of body parts it hardly uses. Thus, if it were to end up on the ground, the unfortunate bird's legs are too short and weak for it to stand. Without being able to lift itself well clear of the ground by standing, its wings (evolved to be extra long for super efficient flying) have not enough space to flap. Hence the bird would be stranded and quickly fall victim to predators. For that reason you won't see them on telephone wires, a sort of evolutionary footnote.

Neither will you see them much after the first week or so of August. For a bird that doesn't normally arrive here until around the first week of May, it is one of our shortest-staying summer birds. As soon as it finishes raising its clutch, it is on its way to its winter quarters. Until a few years ago we had no idea where these were – how would we if they don't breed in the winter so spend their time high in the sky? It was the arrival of tiny geolocators (like a little button battery for a watch) small enough for a bird to carry that we discovered they spend their time circling above central and southern Africa interspersed with long flights out into the Atlantic Ocean. So, one of our best-known summer birds (like the cuckoo) is only actually with us for a small fraction of time.

That's no help of course during May, June and July when swallows, martins and swifts are whizzing round above our heads, all with their legs and plates of meat tucked up under them! Although their wings look superficially similar, swept back for speed, swifts' are significantly longer – making them look truly 'sickle - or scythe-like'. Swallows have slender bodies and long tail streamers, those with the longest being males (of course, men showing off again as usual). Although all the species are lighter underneath, that's not a lot of help when you're looking at them above you against a bright sky. A rule of thumb might be that the higher up they are, the more likely they are to be swifts as they are consummate aerial feeders, quite capable of flying several hundred miles in a day in search of insects if the weather is poor. During this time, if they have any, their chicks can become torpid to survive the extended time without food.

But whether they are swifts, swallows or martins they are there to be marvelled at and enjoyed while they still fly thousands of miles to bring our shared planet alive. They are to be welcomed, as Shakespeare called them, as true guests of summer.
